# Objective(s):

- 1. Identify the nations and major geographical features of Latin America and explain how the physical geography of the region has affected its development.
- 2. Examine Brazilian development from Independence to the present.
- 3. Explain how Latin American artists, musicians, and writers have expressed the history of the region in their works.
- 4. Analyze the social, political, and economic aspects of indigenous civilizations including the Aztecs, Incas, and Mayas and explain how these civilizations have influenced Latin American life today.
- 5. Analyze the manner in which Spain and Portugal conquered the indigenous populations.
- 6. Explain the political, economic, and social structure of the colonial empires that the Spanish and Portuguese established in the region.
- 7. Examine the labor systems implemented by the Spanish and Portuguese, the role of race in the class structure, and the impact of these on modern Latin America.

- 8. Explain the factors leading to the nineteenth century movements for Independence and the leaders and difficulties associated with the rise of Latin American nations.
- 9. Analyze the Mexican Revolution as a significant effort to change problems confronted by other Latin American nations particularly the issue of land ownership.
- 10. Examine how the Mexican Revolution affected Mexico's development in the twentieth century.
- 11. Evaluate the contributions of women to Latin American nations.

Analyze how international relations have affected the social, political, and economic development of Latin America.

- 1. Analyze the rise of revolution in Central America including the role of Cold War politics and the effect of revolutions on these nations.
