Development of standard repertoire including selected solo and method literature for first semester. A juried end of semester performance is required.

Outcomes

Course Outcome(s):

Acquire and develop easy to medium level skills in ear training, traditional and contemporary/jazz harmony, composition, arranging, songwriting, and vocal/instrument performance using applied minor piano as a learning and foundational tool.

Objective(s):

- 1. Perform two easy-to-medium-level selected technical studies from assigned technical literature demonstrating mastery of specific technical problems.
- 2. Perform five major white key scales with correct fingering, hands together with legato and staccato touches, one octave.
- 3. Successfully sight-read two short selections of selected easy- to medium level solo and accompaniment literature.
- 4. Perform two selected easy-to-medium-level solo literature pieces from memory with attention to phrasing, dynamics, and style interpretation.

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- 5. Perform 7th chords from major scales (all keys). [Jazz Studies]
- 6. Perform ii/V7/Imaj.7-4-note basic voicings (two hands, all keys). [Jazz Studies]
- 7. Improvise and comp over a basic blues progression. [Jazz Studies]
- 8. Perform all major scales, one hand alone.

Methods of Evaluation:

- 1. Ongoing review and evaluation of skill level by instructor on session-by-session basis
- 2. Performance of solo literature and method material before jury of music faculty at end of semester
- 3. Participation in master classes

Course Content Outline:

- 1. Technical facility
 - a. Basic techniques of hand, finger, and wrist motor control and touch development
 - b. Concepts, techniques, and skills of achieving tone production and tone quality
 - c. Finger patterns of scales on white keys with various rhythmic applications
 - d. Development of practice procedures and methods
 - e. Triads and chordal patterns and inversions: finger extension, octaves, tenths, etc.
 - f. Beginning pedal studies
 - g. Sight-reading skill development
- 2. Stylistic and performance practices
 - a. Contrasting dynamics and simple phrasing
 - b. Stylistic interpretation of solo repertoire
 - c. Memorization
 - d. Proper presentation practices as related to deportment, dress, placement, and psychological preparation
 - e. Musicality and technical facility through performance of selected solo literature before a live audience
 - f. Psychological and physiological problems of performance
 - q. Chord voicings of diatonic 7th chords (including application to ii/V/I progressions) [Jazz Studies]
 - h. The blues form [Jazz Studies]
