- b. Recognize and employ the Cyrillic alphabet in reading and cursive writing, in order to comprehend and communicate using words, phrases, and a few idiomatic expressions in simple sentences targeted in the course in interpersonal communication.

- Apply with reasonably accuracy basic structural and grammatical elements in very simple exchanges in spoken and written interpersonal communication.
- d. Engage in functional interpersonal communication in speaking and in writing in culturally appropriate ways on very familiar topics.

- b. Apply basic reading techniques studied in this course.
- c. Understand the main idea, as well as a few details, cognates and idiomatic expressions in simple, short, and highly predictable texts on very familiar topics with or without visual support.
- d. Use cultural background to derive meaning from texts.
- e. Use contextual cues for basic comprehension in a variety of texts.
- f. Use visual cues, when images are provided, such as gestures and facial expressions to further advance understanding in reading.

Presentational Speaking: Make a very simple presentation using a variety of highly practiced words, phrases, sentences and memorized expressions.

- a. Introduce oneself, others, objects, places and basic information in a culturally appropriate manner.

- c. Use culturally appropriate gestures and formulaic expressions during oral presentations on familiar topics.
- d. Apply highly practiced phrases and sentences frequently used by native speakers.
- e. Apply vocabulary, phrase, idiomatic expressions, and structurally and grammatically accurate short sentences.

Presentational Writing: Write basic information on very familiar topics using highly practiced words, phrases, a few idiomatic expressions and simple sentences.

- b. Use words, short phrases, a few idioms, memorized culturally appropriate expressions and basic writing conventions.
- c. Write in cursive that is clear and understandable to a reader.
- d. Write short messages and notes in cursive on familiar topics related to personal and general interests using vocabulary, phrases, and idiomatic-expressions, structural and grammatical concepts targeted in this course.
- e. Apply linguistic and structural basic conventions in culturally appropriate manners.

Cultural Knowledge: Recognize and demonstrate basic knowledge of Russian cultural aspects and facts.

- g. Recognize a few elements of everyday culture in Russia.
- h. Recognize and apply cultural nuances when in conversation.
